

ANOTHER EXCITEMENT IN LANAS.—A Serious Disturbance Threatened.—The town of Doniphan, in Kansas, was thrown into a state of excitement on the 6th inst in consequence of a fracas between Capt. John E. Boyd, formerly of South Carolina, and Capt. Mitchell, one of Gen. Lane's aids. The latter, it appears, took exception to a portion of an oration delivered on the 4th by the former, and sent him a challenge to fight a duel with muskets at forty paces. The challenge was accepted, the parties met, and were about to fire when the civil officers arrested them. A letter says:

Whilst the attention of the pro-slavery party was directed to the affair between the billigerents, the free-soiler took thirty-seven of their muskets from a log house not far below the hotel, and carried them to a free-soil boarding house beyond Gen. Lane's mill. As soon as this fact became known, the pro-slavery party sent a committee to demand the restoration of the guns. The free-soilers refused to give them up. The pro-slavery party took them they would give them until two o'clock next day to return them and if they were not then returned, they would come and take them.

Runners were then sent out to the country by both parties for reinforcements, and small squads came flocking in from all quarters, thoroughly prepared for battle.—Night came on, squads still continuing to come in. The storm of war was lowering and portentous. Gen. Whitfield deemed it proper to send an express to Gov. Walker informing him of the condition of things, and to send the records of the land office to Fort Leavenworth for safe keeping.

Just at dark the free State party agreed to bring their muskets to Capt. Duwinn, and were soon attacking them in front of the hotel. The leaders of both parties then promised to observe the peace. It was half past nine o'clock when there was a general dispersion and quiet was again restored. The night before not a citizen of Doniphan had slept an hour. Gen. Lane boasted, after the trouble was over, that on the hill above his will be had counted, of his forces, 250 able bodied men at ten o'clock the night before, and that he could have 500 that night if necessary.

Gen. Egge, late of Maryland, took an active part in restoring peace. Capt. Mitchell is the same man that Titus gagged when a prisoner at Leocompton. He is a carpenter by trade, and sent to Kansas from Covington, Ky. The free-soilers' it appears, refused to join with the pro-slavery men of Doniphan in the celebration of the 4th. Capt. Boyd, in his oration, referred to this fact, and this is what offended Capt. Mitchell.

WRITING MACHINE.—An ingenious piece of mechanism, designed to enable a person to record his thoughts or observations while traveling in the cars, in a crowd, or in a place where ordinary writing apparatus cannot be used, has been invented by Mr. Benjamin Livermore, of Hartland, Vt. The writing on which the writing or rather printing, for it resembles the telegraphic system of printing, is impressed is coiled around two cylinders, which revolve as the lines are completed, and the letters are worked by a set of keys. No ink is required, the letters being colored by a prepared blue paper, against which the writing paper is pressed at each movement of the keys. The machine works with great accuracy and much facility, and is very compact, not exceeding four inches in length by about two and a half in width.—It can easily be carried in a side pocket, and can be used without taking it from the pocket. By it a blind person might be learned to write. Altogether it is one of the most ingenious affairs we ever examined.—Boston Journal.

CROWS IN MORGAN COUNTY.—A gentleman who has been a resident of Morgan county, Ill., a quarter of a century, says that for the last three years he has roved over Morgan co., and with the exception of Fall wheat, he thinks corn, spring wheat oats hay, barely and potatoes, must be double what it has heretofore been. As to corn, it is hard to say whether it will be three or five times the amount. The farmers do not permit the weeds to hold up their heads this year.

HOW THE CUBAN TARIFF IS EVASDED.—An intelligent citizen of Havana tells the editor of the Savannah Republican how the heavy and onerous import duties of the ever faithful late are sometimes evaded. A vessel, entirely empty, clears for instance, at Havana for Matanzas, or any other domestic port, with a constructive cargo of flour; the customary duty on which when arriving from foreign countries, is \$9 85 per barrel. With papers all regular she goes to sea, falls in by previous agreement, with an American vessel on the coast of Florida or elsewhere actually freighted with the same dutiable article. The cargo is transferred and the vessel which left Havana entirely empty proceeds on her voyage and entering the port for which she had formally cleared, throws the flour upon the market duty free.

Trial of Reaping and Mowing Machines. SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 15.—The second and third mowers came off this afternoon the many machines with Wood's improvement again taking the palm as regards rapidity of execution.
